In *Shaped by the Word*, M. Robert Mulholland, Jr., explores the role of scripture in spiritual formation. He contends: "First of all, the scripture is the optimum record of the intrusion of the Word of God into human history ...

Second, ... it is also a revelation of the Word as the [matrix or] context of human brokenness and human wholeness."

Mulholland continues, "As such a revelation, the Word of God is portrayed in scripture as doing at least three things:

When the Word of God intrudes, encounters, or breaks in, it addresses human beings in their brokenness. That is part of the good news: we don't have to measure up to some level of wholeness before the Word addresses us.

The Word calls us to wholeness right at the point of our brokenness!

... The scripture is a revelation of the Word addressing our brokenness and calling us to wholeness

Scripture is the revelation of the Word as the agent of transformation. As stewards of scripture we have "insight into the ways in which the Word penetrates human lives and situations, discerns/reveals the truth of the human condition, and transforms the garbled, distorted, debased words human beings have become into the words God speaks them forth to be in the world."
